### **RESOURCES**

#### **Development Services Ontario (DSO)**

#### What is DSO?

Developmental Services Ontario (DSO) helps adults with developmental disabilities connect to services and supports within their communities. Wherever you live in Ontario, DSO can help you or someone you care for connect with: residential supports, caregiver respite, community participation supports (such as for volunteering or employment), professional and specialized services, the passport program and person-directed planning, and various other supports to assist individuals with disabilities to become more involved in their communities.

### **Connecting with DSO:**

- Your local DSO can provide information on services and supports available in your community
- It's important to connect to the DSO as soon as possible because the waiting lists for services are long
- Connect with the DSO as soon as possible after your child turns 16. This way, by the time your child is ready to graduate high school and/or turns 18, your son or daughter will be able to access all the supports and services for which he or she may be eligible

#### **DSO's Definition of Developmental Disability:**

- Present at birth or is developed before 18 years of age
- Affects a person's ability to learn
- Permanent
- Mild or severe

The Developmental Services Sector has changed a lot over recent years. The Services and Supports to Promote the Social Inclusion of Persons with Developmental Disabilities Act stipulates who is entitled to services and supports and how they may apply for services. It ensures that services and supports are of high quality and that people have more choice in which services they select for themselves or their loved ones.

Today, the focus is on individualized funding supports and services designed to better reflect, support and include adults living with developmental disabilities in all facets of life.

### **HOT OFF THE PRESSES!**

The Ontario Developmental Services Housing Task Force has presented its final report: **Generating Ideas and Enabling Action: Addressing the Housing Crisis Confronting Ontario Adults with Developmental Disabilities.** 

The Developmental Services Housing Task Force was created by the Ministry of Community and Social Services in 2014 following a recommendation made by the Housing Study Group of the joint Ministry of Community and Social Services / Developmental Services Sector Partnership Table, in their final report Ending the Wait – an Action Agenda to Address the Housing Crisis Confronting Ontario Adults with Developmental Disabilities, tabled in September 2013.

Tasked with exploring innovative ideas for dealing with the steadily worsening housing problems confronting an especially vulnerable sector of the population, the HTF used wide-ranging consultations and research to design thirteen key recommendations.

We will be reviewing and considering the 13 recommendations made in the report as we explore the housing crisis for adults with intellectual disabilities in our communities.
